






HEALTH SERVICES

Health Services is the umbrella that covers our array of integrated clinical programs. All of our providers are trained and experienced in working with individuals with disabilities and their caregivers. Our team of highly skilled primary care providers serves as the gateway to a wide range of in-house specialty services. We are the one stop shop for the health care needs of individuals with disabilities.



DENTAL CLINIC

The Dental Clinic boasts a specialized team of dentists, dental hygienists, and dental students, with an adapted clinic environment and a mobile dental clinic to best meet the oral health needs of children and adults with disabilities.





INTEGRATED BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

Integrated Behavioral Health Services provide the highest level of psychiatry and psychology support for the management of all mental health and behavioral needs for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

SPEECH AND HEARING SERVICES

WIHD has been providing Speech and Hearing Services for more than 5 decades. Our audiologists test hearing, help select the most appropriate hearing aids, and ensure the best possible solutions for each person's listening needs. Speech-language pathologists evaluate, diagnose and treat impairments in speech, language, social-communication, and swallowing for both children and adults to improve their quality of life.







ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM

Our Assistive Technology Program provides services across the lifespan. In addition to individual evaluations and consultations, we run a technology loan library, which allows individuals to borrow and test devices before needing to buy.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT NETWORK

The Community Support Network (CSN) provides support and technical assistance to more than 8,000 individuals with disabilities and family members, from early intervention to the transition into adult services. CSN also provides resources, training, direct services, and guidance to professionals, schools, and agencies. Our innovative programs promote self-advocacy and community inclusion; train professionals in best practices; and educate families so that they have the tools to help children, youth, and adults with disabilities live their best lives.

Virtual platforms proved very beneficial for the delivery of our education, training and technical assistance programs. Attendance at our family, community, and educational workshops soared; nearly doubling both the number of offerings and attendees from 2020.



HEAR OUR VOICES: LEADERSHIP AND SELF-ADVOCACY

Hear Our Voices, WIHD's self-advocacy program, has developed a Speaker's Network of self-advocates who present at local, state, and national conferences. The Speaker's Network offers individualized coaching to young adults with disabilities who want to share their story. The program empowers self-advocates to use their lived experiences to increase disability awareness. They have presented at local colleges and various statewide and national conferences.

INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES PROJECT

Dan Habib, renowned film maker, public speaker, and disability rights advocate, joined WIHD in July as the Inclusive Communities Project Director. Dan has produced several award-winning documentary films on disability-related topics. His films include Including Samuel, Intelligent Lives, Who Cares About Kelsey?, Mr. Connolly Has ALS, as well as a number of short films. Dan, along with his son, Samuel, are working on their latest feature-length film, My Disability Roadmap, which follows Samuel, a young adult who wants to date, leave home, and go to college.



RESEARCH DEPARTMENT

As an academic institution, WIHD conducts innovative research and uses what we are learning to educate current and future professionals. Each year, hundreds of students from affiliated universities and colleges participate in fellowships, internships, research and clinical rotations at WIHD.

The Research Department conducts projects on a variety of topics in the areas of clinical, educational, and social-behavioral research. Our findings are shared with the broader community of disability professionals through presentations and publications to promote systems change and effective programs and strategies.

LEND PROGRAM

WIHD's Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disorders (LEND) Program is an interdisciplinary leadership training program focusing on development across the lifespan, disability policy and advocacy, research methodology, cultural competency, and family-centered practices. LEND trainees include graduate students and post-doctoral fellows; self-advocates; and family members of children and adults with disabilities.

For over 35 years, WIHD has provided innovative and comprehensive services and supports to children and families involved with the child welfare system in Westchester County. Everything we do is designed to improve overall health and well-being of the children we serve and our therapeutic and educational services are delivered using trauma-informed care principles. We provide trainings for parents whose children came into foster care as a result of neglect or abuse and our Aftercare program provides support to ensure the successful reunification of children who return home. Project Impact is a unique and specialized program

that supports parents with an intellectual disability whose children are at risk of entering foster care.

The Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) at WIHD provides coordination for the multi-disciplinary assessment of children with suspected sexual and/ or physical abuse. The CAC is integrated with our Child Abuse Pediatrics Program, the largest forensic medical practice in the state of New York. The program is viewed as a model for state-of-the-art forensic medicine presented in a compassionate manner.







FAMILY CONNECTION: EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICE **COORDINATION PROGRAM**

WIHD's Early Intervention Service Coordination Program, or Family Connection, is exclusively staffed by parents of children with disabilities. Our multicultural staff provides true family centered care, in navigating often confusing systems, serving as a link to community resources and opportunities, and giving families empowerment and support.





RESPONSE TO COVID AND VACCINE CLINIC

Through extensive advocacy, and in partnership with the Westchester County Department of Health, WIHD was able to establish a COVID-19 vaccine clinic; turning our lobby into a state of the art vaccination site. With the support of many WIHD staff and volunteers, we were able to provide life-saving vaccines to over 450 individuals with disabilities, staff, and family members.


