





# Transition Planning Timeline: High School

This document provides knowledge of different resources and supports to help parents/caregivers plan for transitions throughout their child's life experience from pre-school to adulthood.

	Rehabilitation) if not already done in 8 <sup>th</sup> grade (when student is 14).		
	Measurable postsecondary goals for transition from school must be in the IEP* the year the		
	student turns 15.		
	Student participates in IEP meeting and sets IEP transition goals from age 15, these goals should		
	be reviewed at the annual IEP meeting every year through graduation or age 21.		
	Apply for accommodations to take PSAT, SAT, and Advanced Placement (AP) exams, by having a		
	Services for Students with Disabilities (SSD) Coordinator submit an Accommodations Request.		
	Familiarize yourself with the Committee on Special Education (CSE) and IEP contacts as needed.

High School 17-18 years (12 <sup>th</sup> grade)	<ul> <li>Explore work-based learning opportunities.</li> <li>Post-Secondary Education Applications (see below for programs for students with disabilities).</li> <li>Learn about and fill out <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).</u></li> <li>Student participates in IEP meeting and sets IEP transition goals.</li> <li>Have final IEP meeting and obtain exit summary if applicable.</li> <li>Familiarize yourself with CSE and IEP contacts as needed.</li> </ul>		
Post High School 18-21 years	<ul> <li>□ Apply for OPWDD if not already done. While there is no age limit on applying to OPWDD it is recommended to apply when students turn 18 so they can receive adult benefits.</li> <li>□ Plan for Guardianship if appropriate (NYS Court Guardianship information) or supported decision making at 18 years (Supported Decision Making NY).</li> <li>□ Consider the need for residential opportunities, complete applications, as appropriate.</li> <li>□ Obtain photo ID.</li> <li>□ Apply for ACCES-VR (if not already done).</li> <li>□ Apply for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Medicaid as needed.</li> <li>□ Complete the SSI Age 18 Redetermination, if receiving benefits.</li> <li>□ Learn about and visit outside adult and employment agencies, where appropriate.</li> <li>□ Have final IEP meeting and obtain exit summary.</li> </ul>

# Other Resources: High School

#### Education

<u>504 Plans.</u> A 504 plan is a legal document falling under the provisions of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. It is designed to plan a program of instructional services to assist students with special needs who are in a regular education setting. A 504 plan is not an Individualized Education Program (IEP) as is required for special education students. However, a student moving from special education to a regular education placement could be placed under a 504 plan.

CareerZone. Free career exploration and planning system for NYS students.

<u>College Board.</u> Information on accommodations on College Board Exams.

<u>Federal & NYS College Financial Aid Programs.</u> Information on different financial aid programs offered at the state and federal level, as well as institutional aid and outside scholarships

NYS 529 College Savings Program. A type of investment account used for higher education savings, which can offer different tax benefits for families. Parents, grandparents, other relatives, and friends can open a 529 account, as long as they are a United States Citizen or resident alien.

NYS Education Department. Information on transition from high school to post-school.

Office of Special Education (OSE) Educational Partnership. A coordinated and cohesive network of support focused on enhancing services and supports for students with disabilities from early childhood and school-age education to engagement in post-school opportunities. This list contains contact information for each Regional Team across the State.







### **Employment**

ACCES-VR (Adult Career and Continuing Education Services Vocational Rehabilitation). Employment services for individuals with disabilities aged 14 and up. For eligibility and application information call 800-222-JOBS (5627).

American Job Centers. Provides direct employment and training services 877-872-5627.

<u>Careers Support Solutions.</u> Provides job readiness skills, coordinate internships, secure job placements, provide on-the-job training, offer follow-along support.

Easterseals New York. Provides employment and vocational training services.

<u>Pre-Employment Transition Services.</u> Viability program provides students 14-22 years of age with job readiness skills 631-887-3641.

### **Funding Sources**

<u>ABLE-NY.</u> Tax-advantaged savings programs for eligible people with disabilities (or designated beneficiaries). Funds from these 529A accounts can help designated beneficiaries pay for qualified disability expenses.

Office for People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD). Coordinates services for people with developmental disabilities, including intellectual disabilities, cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, autism spectrum disorders, Prader-Willi syndrome, and other neurological impairments. For eligibility and application information call 866-946-9733.

<u>Supplemental Security Income (SSI).</u> To determine eligibility and apply for SSI 800-772-1213.

## Guardianship
